Linda Sharpnack, Reiman Gardens

Mary Dufelmeier introduced Linda Sharpnack who is a volunteer for Reiman Gardens. Linda is a retired elementary school (4th grade) teacher from Ames. She shared that when she was teaching she would bring her students to Boone to the Historical Center to experience the Kate Shelley story! Linda began by offering a “disclaimer” that she was not an official spokesperson for Reiman Gardens and that she was “just” a volunteer (as anyone who was here can attest, Linda was an excellent spokesperson and much more than “just” a volunteer!). The mission of Reiman Gardens is to educate, enchant, and inspire an appreciation of plants, butterflies, and the beauty of the natural world. She shared that last year there was 81289 visitors to Reiman Garden which are located immediately adjacent to Jack Trice Stadium on 17 acres of land. They offered 241 different classes with 4391 participants learning about gardening, flower arranging, and photography. There are three active vegetable gardens including a children’s garden, a town and country garden, and a trial garden that is used as a test plot for Proven Winner seeds. They have a host of special events including several “after hours”

events involving live music, a huge plant sale on Mother’s Day weekend, and Spirits in the Garden around Halloween where they have over 600 carved pumpkins scattered throughout the gardens (which is a supercool event!). In addition the extensive outdoor gardens they have an indoor space with orchids and other “hot house” plants and a butterfly garden! Linda encouraged everyone to come and visit or to consider buying a membership (\$44 a year) which provides unlimited access to the gardens!
