
and Andrew was happy to be back after spending last week in Wisconsin— sounds like he had a great time! Lisa was happy about our Highway Litter Project coming up that evening!

## Aaron Putze, Iowa Soybean Association

Lisa introduced Aaron Putze who is the Director of Communications for the Iowa Soybean Association. Aaron is originally from West Bend, Iowa (Home of the Grotto and Butter Braid Breads!) and he is a member of the Waukee Rotary Club. He also has written a book about Iowa Hawkeye legend Chuck Long (who has spoken to our club about the Iowa Sports Foundation in the past!). Aaron shared that there is often a debate in agriculture about using crops for “food versus fuel”. He noted that an even larger portion of crops went towards “fuel” in the past when grain (oats, hay, and corn) was used as “fuel” for oxen and horses (and yields were far less on top of that). Aaron noted that there are 42,000 members of the Iowa Soybean Association and that they produced 562 million bushels of soybeans in 2017—and that figure could rise to over 600 million this year. He did share that 98% of the “customer base” for Iowa soybeans is outside of the USA—so Iowa is VERY dependent on trade with other countries, which is why the current situation with China (which imports more soybeans than all other countries together) is so concerning. China uses a lot of soybeans for

animal feed. As a result of some of the trade concerns, soybean prices are down almost \$3 per bushel since March and crop prices as a whole are down almost 40% over the past five years. This impacts the income of farms which in turn impacts their decisions relating to the purchase of new equipment, pickups, etc. which affects other segments of the economy.
