## Latvian Church Planting Project-Tim Trudeau

Joe Smith introduced Tim Trudeau who presented a program (split in two halves by the arrival of the food) on his experiences and involvement with a church planting project in Latvia. Tim shared that Latvia is one of the Baltic countries (along with Lithuania and Estonia). The countries have been rule at various times by Germany, then Sweden and Poland, and then were annexed by Russia in the 1800's. They gained their independence in 1918 only to go back under Soviet rule after WW 2. They gained their independence again in 1990 after the collapse of the Soviet Union. At that time about half the population was Latvian and about half Russian. Since independence a fairly high percentage of Russian speakers have left the country which has a population of just about 2 million-half of whom live in the capital city of Riga. Tim described Riga as being like many older European capitals but life in the country is akin to what it would have been like in northern Minnesota 100 years ago (limited resources, electricity, plumbing). The Soviets closed all the churches so when Latvia regained its independence there were still some church buildings (more like museums) but very little in the way

of an organized church infrastructure. Tim was contact 22 years ago about helping out with church planting (helping support new churches starting again) and since then he has made 21 trips to Latvia (and Joe went once as well and fell and got a huge bruise on his "thigh" that was treated with a cabbage leaf! Tim enjoys working with the people involved in forming new churches and has helped out by teaching in their Bible college which works to develop church leaders as well. Thanks to Tim for a very interesting program and not sharing the picture of Joe's bruise!
