## Diane Hinderaker, Boone County Probation

Eldon Hutcheson introduced Diane Hinderaker of Boone County Probation to present on update on their programs. Diane noted the cost of incarceration can run over \$90 so if there are alternative community-based options to work with offenders it can be both effective and a cost savings to counties/taxpayers. She shared that the biggest change they have undergone recently is the addition of services for Greene County which really has not had a functioning probation program in the past. The most common offenses that result in probation services being ordered include OWI, possession of controlled substances, and domestic abuse/assault. As of

November they currently have 155 clients and in Greene they have 10 (they could serve up to 20 in their pilot program there). They also work with the schools and the Boone County Attorney to address student truancy issues.
