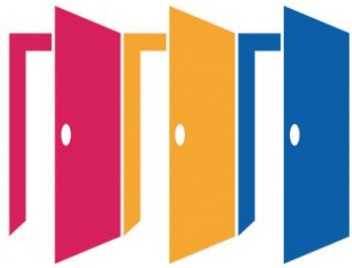

Brian Mehlhaus and Joe Smith—COVID UPDATE

Brian began by sharing that 2020 has had an “interesting” spring...and summer...and now fall. He said that currently they are seeing about 7-8 new cases of COVID 19 detected a day in the county. The hospital has some rooms that are equipped as “negative pressure” to prevent air from the rooms of those hospitalized with the virus from being recirculated. He noted that they have not had have patients admitted to the Intensive Care Unit so far. He did say that the care facilities in Boone have largely avoided having any cases. The Madrid Home did have some cases about the time of the derecho which took the roof of their facility off which created some challenges. Brian expressed some frustration with the state of testing despite having 3 (or 4) different testing options. Boone County Hospital did receive one of the Rapid Testing machines but because they received so many tests from care facilities in central Iowa they had a hard time keeping up with supplies. They also can use the State Hygienic Lab for symptomatic patients which (normally) has a three day turnaround time for results as well as an independent lab but because of the number of tests they have been receiving the turnaround time has been between 5-10 days. As of this time there have been approximately 500 cases and 8 deaths associated with COVID 19 in Boone County. Brian did say that the clinics are busy again after a period several months ago when patients were deferring regular, ongoing care. The side effect of deferring care is that some patients with chronic conditions got a bit off the rails, so they working to get them back under good control and medical management again. Brian stressed that masks are essential to controlling the spread and reducing the risk of contracting the coronavirus—and he

was a bit frustrated with the messaging relating to that in Iowa. Joe shared that the pandemic has paradoxically “helped” the hospital’s financial position despite a 50% reduction in their census and doing no elective surgeries between mid-March and June. He said that the hospital received financial support from the stimulus, CARES act, and Payroll Protecting Program that allowed them to weather the storm—resulting in having upwards of 120 days of cash (to pay bills) on hand. The last time he spoke to us this cushion was far less. Joe also noted that the 340B program within the Affordable Care Act has been extremely beneficial to the hospital and community with respect to reimbursement for medications. Without it (or some viable alternative) the hospital would lose over \$2 million a year in revenue (and with it they generally end the year only about \$500,000 in the black, so you can do the math).
